When we are first introduced to God in the Bible, He is thinking and speaking and acting like God. He thinks and speaks the world with all its life and laws into existence. He forms mankind and gives us our new home

the bone, and the organs from the meat. And that portion which remains is choice, desired, cut-apart. It is "holy."

The Hebrews used this designation to describe anything set apart for God because they understood God to be holy, to be set apart from everything and anything else. He is the absolutely "other," unlike anyone or anything

else. Because He is like no other and has no equal, nothing was to be used to try to represent Him. He is holy holy. Most holy.

In the story of the Fall, we understand that God is holy not simply because He is other, unlike anyone

or anything else, but because He is other than the fallenness of humans, other than the sinfulness in this present world order, other than the deception and murderous intent of the enemy of all righteousness. God is moral perfection in Himself. He is the means by which we know that all that is other than He is morally deficient.

And so, between God and fallen man is a moral chasm. He is morally right, we are morally corrupted. And because He is moral perfection in Himself, all that He says is morally perfect and all that He does is morally perfect—all that He thinks, decides, plans, and wills is holy, holy, holy because God is holy.

If this were the whole understanding of

with a few directions for what to do and how to care for it. He is God—good, benevolent, thoughtful, wise, fully in charge, loading our existence with blessings rich and varied.

The coming of sin is a chapter that mars and separates and wrecks the good and beautiful world. This is an ugly part of the story, but it is in the context of this chapter of man's history that we best understand the holiness of God. The word "holiness" is not referred to in the biblical record of the story; the concept is unmistakably imbedded.

The Hebrew word translated *holy* is borrowed from the butcher shop—the work of the knife. It means literally "cut apart." As the butcher uses his knife to cut, he removes the objectionable from the desired—the fat,

ing themselves. He is not calling men and women to sober faces and dull living for the rest of eternity.

This holy God engages in the real world with His sleeves rolled up. He reaches across the divide. He, in all His holiness, puts His arms around people and draws them to Himself. He speaks not in tones of cold command, but in words of hope and invitation. He beckons people toward Himself. He takes people like Noah, Abraham, Jacob, and Samson into His plans. He bridges the divide. He speaks and acts toward redemption.

When He speaks of moral issues, He tells us what is right and what is wrong, and He doesn't fudge—thou shalt, and thou shalt not. His commands are for our restoration and salvation. And He speaks these commands out of the essence of His being.

The holiness of God is not always pleasing to us. Indeed, to our sinful hearts sometimes it flashes like lightning, beats upon us like a sledgehammer, or searches us out to the point of great embarrassment. Good men and women cringe before the holiness of God; sinful men and women die. We are sometimes terrified by the flashes of God's unveiled holiness.

And in those cowering moments, we might like to make God different. More like us. We'd like to change Him so He could say, "Thou shalt not commit adultery, except under great

stress." Or, "Thou shalt not steal, except from corrupt governments or from big, greedy corporations." We would like to change the reality of sin. We would like at least sometimes to call evil good and good evil. And we would especially like to change the consequences of sin. It doesn't really lead to death. It doesn't always bring sorrow and pain. But we could never make such changes without changing who God is. And if we could change who God is, He would no longer be good and holy and true.

To understand holiness rightly, we must understand that God defines holiness rather than the other way around. And that means holiness is good.

The old writers—even under the glare of a less gracious covenant—understood that the holiness of God at the core was all that we could desire or hope for. They spoke of the "beauty of holiness." It was not frigid or stark or barren against a black-and-white landscape, but alive with radiance and glory.

God gave them pictures and ceremonies and illustrations to help them toward the truth. He asked them, for example, to build a place—a holy, holy, holy place. It was made to appeal to each of the senses. In the scintillating light of the lamps, they saw glittering gold, decorative carvings, and multicolored weavings. They smelled the aromatic incense and the burnt offerings. They tasted the specially

made wafers and choice portions of sacrifice. They heard the bells and the ram's horns and the psalms sung and played on a variety of stringed instruments. They felt the wetness of water and blood and rich anointing oil as well as the warm priestly hands of blessing. At times they saw special flashes/revelations of glory—a fiery cloud covering the tent of meeting, Mount Sinai billowing like a furnace gone berserk.

All this visual and tactile and aural display trumpeted something loud and clear. God is beauty beyond description. He is set apart in glory. There is no one like Him—ever was or ever will be. He is light and loveliness and grandeur beyond our wildest imagination. He stoops to using the best we know and understand to show us that the real glory, our present senses simply could not take in.

The holiness of God is the reason, the cause, the foundation for all that is holy in this world. Because God is holy, the places He has chosen to reveal Himself are holy. Such common substances as stones, bowls, utensils, fire, oil, and furniture become holy. And the people who follow God are likewise holy. In both covenants, this God says to His people, "Be holy, because I am holy" (Leviticus 11.44; 1 Peter 1.16).

He calls us to dedicate our lives to Him, even our bodies and the "members" of our

Holy people eat. They work, they type, they garden, they change diapers, they make mistakes, they paint, they think, they dream, they sing—on and off key—in short, they enter into life in all its dimensions. But they are His. And because they are His,

they are marked. In His eyesight, they stand out—choice, desired, set apart, holy.
